Superintendent of Industry and Commerce (SIC) of Colombia





served on the Attorney General's Task Force on Intellectual Property and as Co-Chair of the Merger Working Group of the International Competition Network.




reconstruction of the Bergen Center for Competition Law and Economics.

Matthew Boswell was appointed Commissioner of Competition of the Competition Bureau (Canada) (“Bureau”) on March 5, 2019, for a five-year term. Mr. Boswell first joined the Bureau as Associate Deputy Commissioner, Criminal Matters. He then became Senior Deputy Commissioner, Cartels and Deceptive Marketing Practices as well as he worked as Senior Deputy Commissioner, Mergers and Monopolistic Practices. President of the Sixth Chamber of the Conseil d'Etat in charge of cases in the fields of Justice, Finance, Environment and Regulated professions.



It has also been incorporated into the DOJ/FTC Horizontal Merger Guidelines. He received his A.B. in Economics and History from Cornell University and his J.D., cum laude, from Georgetown University Law Center.



Han Li Toh is the Chief Executive and a Commissioner of the Competition & Consumer Commission of Singapore. He has served as a Justices' Law Clerk to the Chief Justice of Singapore, Deputy Public Prosecutor and State Counsel in the Attorney-General's Chambers, Senior Assistant Registrar at the Supreme Court and as Registrar and Principal District Judge of the State Courts. by ASCOLA, the world network of professors of antitrust law and economics.




